

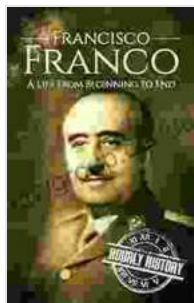

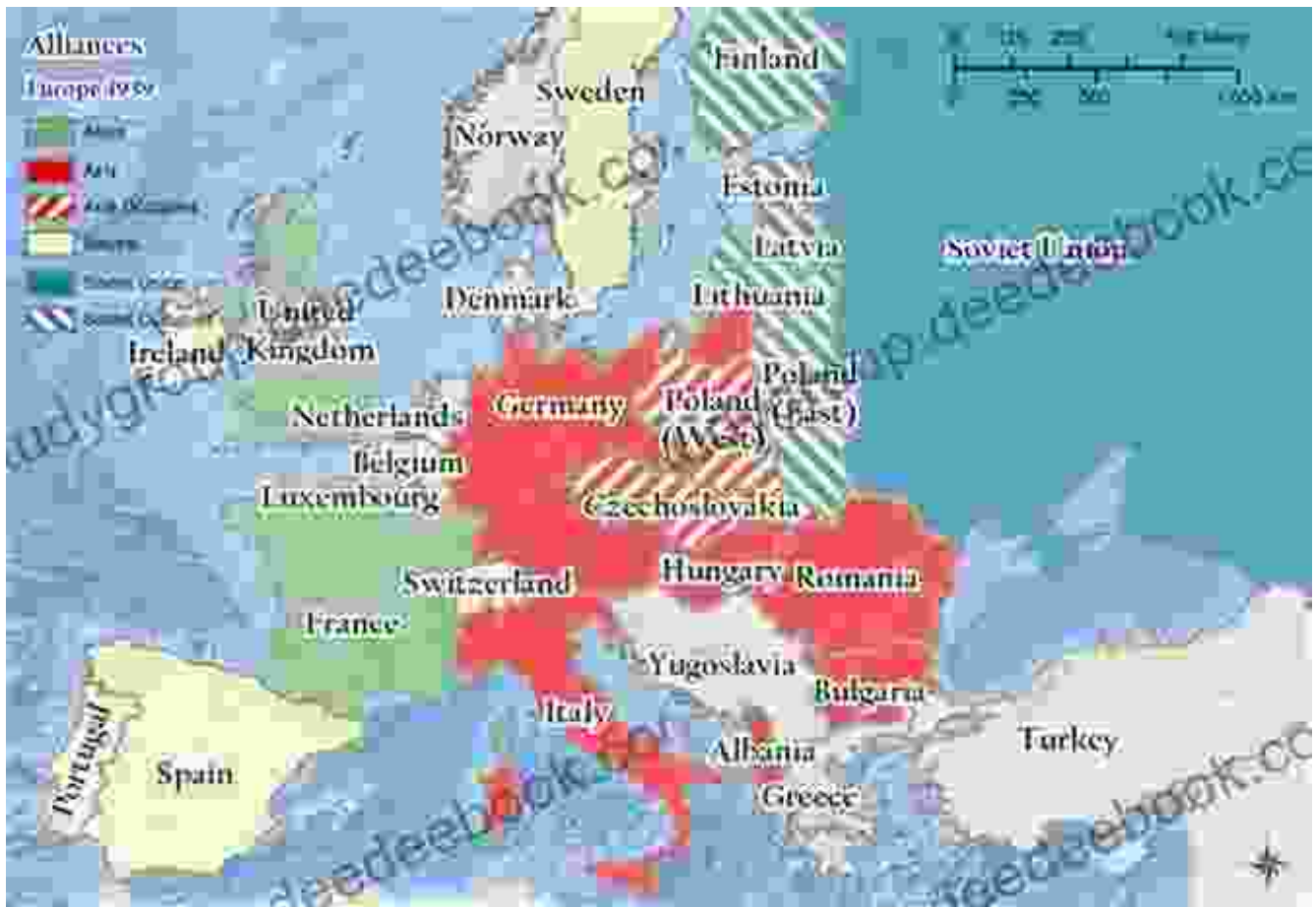

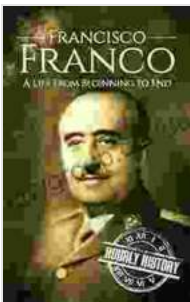
Lessons Learned

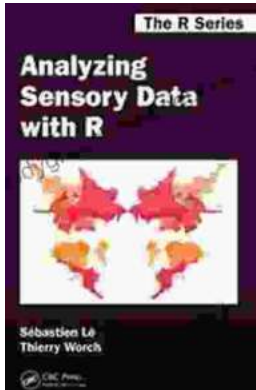

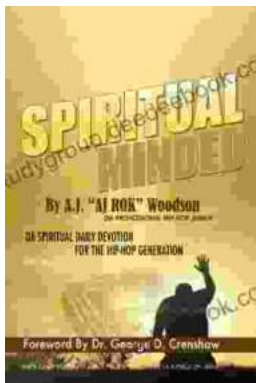
