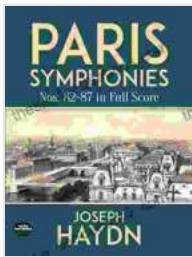


Paris Symphonies Nos. 82 & 87 in Full Score: A Comprehensive Analysis of Haydn's Orchestral Masterpieces

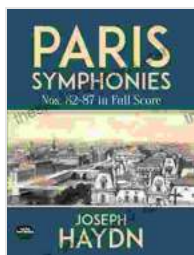

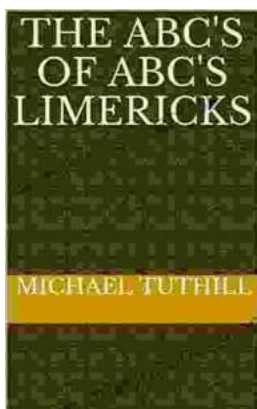

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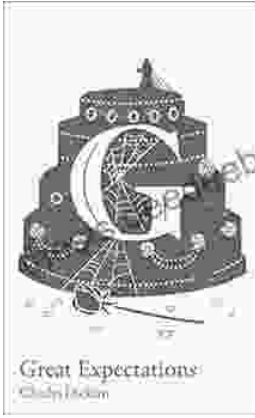
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
