
Slim Harpo: The Blues King Bee of Baton Rouge

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James Moore (June 11, 1924 – January 31, 1970),better known by his stage name Slim Harpo, was an American blues musician, singer, and songwriter. He was born in Loeb, Louisiana, and raised in Baton Rouge. Harpo began playing the harmonica at an early age and was influenced by the music of John Lee Hooker, Muddy Waters, and Lightnin' Hopkins. He developed his own unique style of blues that was characterized by his soulful vocals, distinctive harmonica playing, and catchy rhythms. In 1957, Harpo signed with Excello Records and released his debut single, "I'm a King Bee." The song was a regional hit and established Harpo as a rising star in the blues world. 
Musical Style

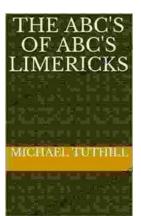
