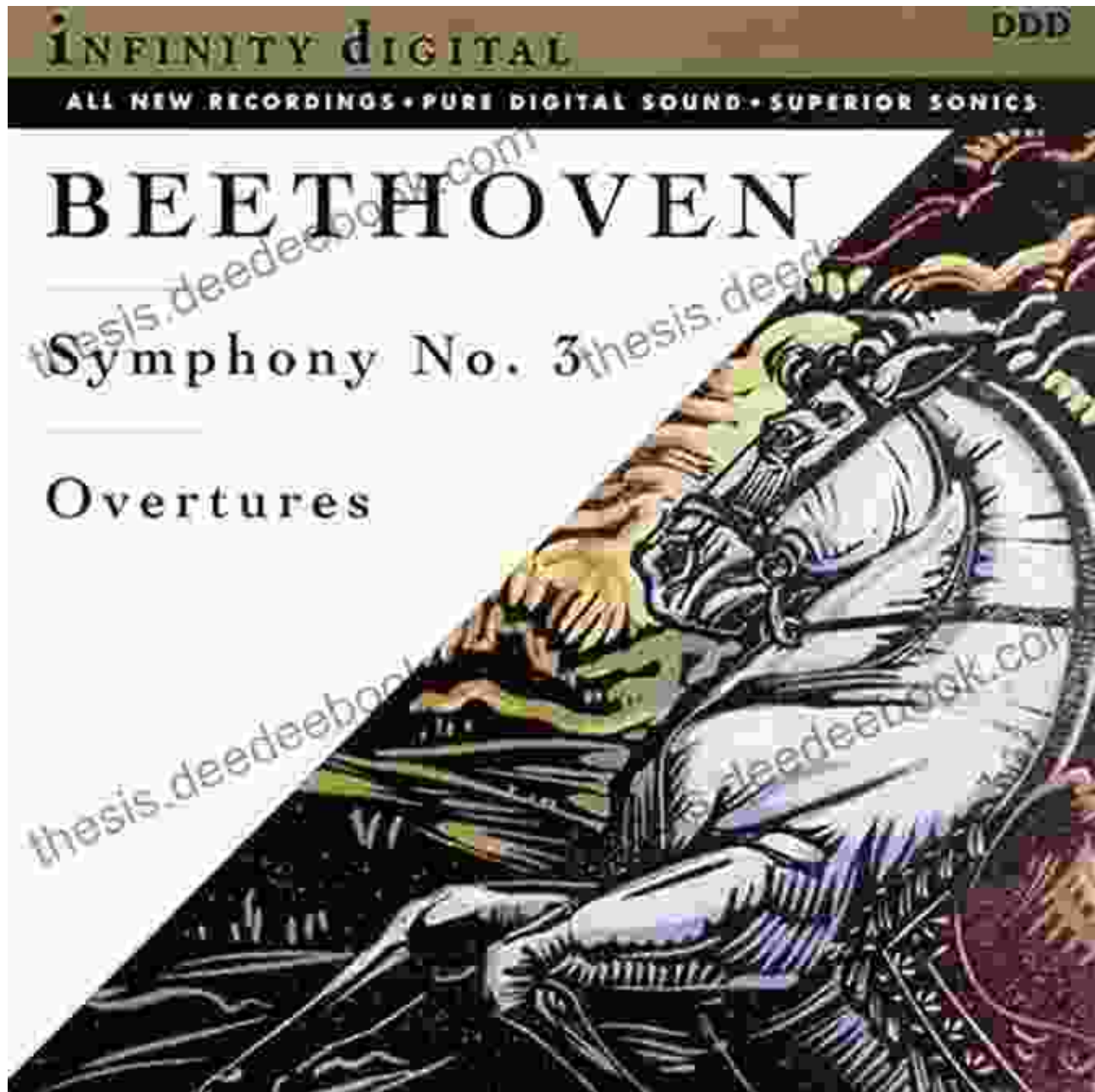

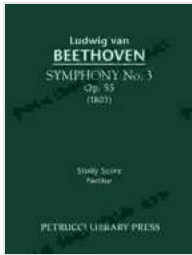

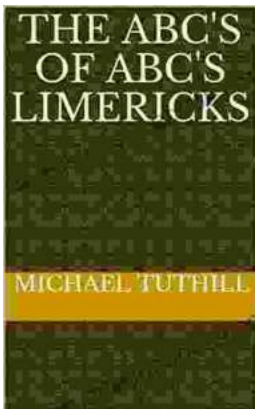

Symphony No. 3, Op. 55 - Full score (Beethovens Werke, Serie I) by Ludwig van Beethoven

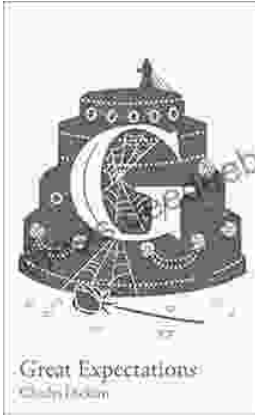
