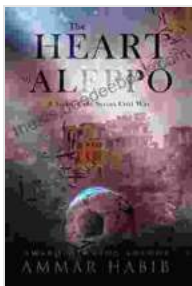

Gates and Entrances to Aleppo's Old City



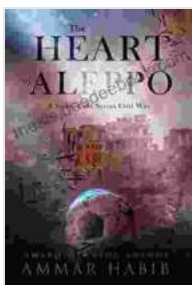
Aleppo's Old City is enclosed by massive stone walls, punctuated by seven monumental gates that provide access to the city's labyrinthine interior.

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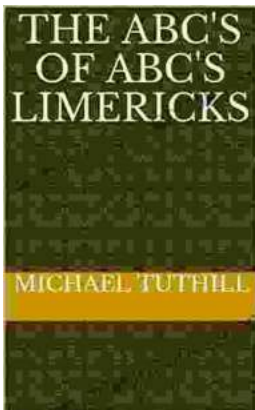
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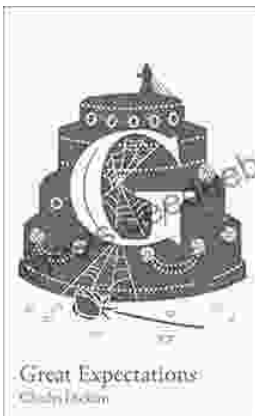
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
